
Paediatric cervical lymphadenopathy referral pathway - Summary Clinical Guideline

Please avoid requesting USS neck prior to assessment by ENT or paediatrics for red flag neck lumps Stable or long-standing neck lumps can be referred to ENT routinely prior to USS neck.

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A consensus guideline has recently been published which recommends avoiding ultrasound in children with small and fluctuating cervical lymphadenopathy or those without red flag symptoms to avoid delay in assessment in secondary care or unnecessary investigations. Ultrasound alone cannot distinguish between benign and malignant lymph nodes.

Following this guideline, ENT, paediatrics and radiology have written a trust pathway on managing and referring children with lymphadenopathy in primary care. Part of this pathway involves radiology no longer offering ultrasounds for neck lumps in paediatric patients who lack any reg flag symptoms or with small and fluctuating neck lumps.
